Lower Great Lakes FWCO Hosts Lake Trout Meeting (February 4-5): The 27th annual meeting of the Lower Lakes Lake Trout Work Group took place at the Iroquois NWR this month. The group is composed of natural resources agencies from the United States and Canada working in Lake Erie and Lake Ontario. The group discussed the latest trends in lake trout populations as well as updates on research projects and stocking levels. The latest on sea lamprey treatments was also discussed. Biologist Presents at 2016 New York American Fisheries Society Meeting (February 10-12): The New York chapter of the American Fisheries Society annual meeting was held in Cooperstown, NY on February 10-12. Curt Karboski, Biologist, Lower Great Lakes FWCO, presented preliminary results from the office's research using pop-up satellite tags to track movement and behavior of lake trout in Lake Ontario. Over 100 local scientists and managers attended the meeting and Curt's preliminary results were very well received. This pop-up satellite tag research is answering questions about fish behavior that researchers have never been able to address before. The feedback and discussions that arise at fisheries conferences are invaluable to furthering and refining the research being performed by FWS Biologists. (Contact: Curt Karboski)
